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### Interaction with Gifted Students-A psychology undergrad's experience

One of my first experiences with gifted children was conducting this activity about the ship of Theseus paradox with level one children. The situation is thus- if a ship is slowly repaired over time such that each part of it is replaced eventually, then does it remain to be the same ship? Moreover, if we take all the older parts of that ship and reassemble them, does this ship also remain the same?

I presented the question to the children. At first, I was kind of overwhelmed with the way in which the kids were responding, they were enthusiastic to get their point across but also wanted to make sure that they covered their point in depth. This led to a lot of talking over each other and raised voices and excited body

#### language.

Then, I asked them to either build on each other's point or refute it, so that the conversation became connected. I also started to add my own ideas to their statements. By increasing the challenge levels. Slowly, the entire demeanor of the group changed to that of a sophisticated debate. It was then that I was able to get a glimpse of the dichotomy of the gifted- to be handed thoughts beyond your years but also retain the excitement of your age. It was only when both were synched up properly that the kids were able to truly get the most out of the activity.

The help may come in the form of friendly advice from parents who have already gone through similar experiences raising their child. This platform is also a good way of gathering information about numerous enhanced learning camps, extra-curricular activities, lectures, etc., as suited to one's child's needs.

There is a saying, "happy parents reflect into a happy child." The parent support group would ensure every parent to not feel unguided, misguided and alone through one's child's journey My husband and I attended the very first Parent Support Group meet with no idea as to what to expect. As one by one the parents started sharing about their kids, an experienced higher level parent opened up about her gifted child's doubt-filled journey not only through school but college too. Although our kid is quite young, some of her fears resonated with us and at the same time assured us too. We realized that this group is a perfect place for a parent to vent out our own anxiety and uncontrollable emotions as to be an amazing strong support pillar for our kid's decision making years.




# Goodwill in Giftedness: A Review of **Good Will Hunting**

inema has always been a great way to bridge the gaps between various perspectives of people from different backgrounds and provide a neutral zone of exploration and understanding. Such has been the case with the film "Good Will Hunting".

The film follows the story of Will- a twentyyear-old gifted boy who enjoys working on mathematical problems that baffle most Harvard PHDs and read law books that most lawyers suffer through. But rather than work in any of these exciting fields professionally, he chooses to be a construction worker, or a janitorsomething that brings in barely enough money for him to afford beers with his friends and a cheap meal- a safer and stress-free life. However, the main exploration into the challenges of the gifted comes from Robin Williams' character, who plays Will's therapist and helps him work through some of the more deep-rooted issues that prevent him from living up to his potential- both academically and emotionally.

The film does an exceptional job at showcasing the emotional complexity and the sensitivity that comes alongside the heightened cognitive and creative abilities of the gifted. It shows the extent to which traumatic events can bury themselves in gifted people, causing them to mask their giftedness for a feeling of security. A must watch as a family and to discuss it so that each student can reflect what this movie brings to their learning.






# EDUCATOR'S SUMMIT

Educator's Summit, Asia was a two days event organized by KGERC in collaboration with Partner's in Upbringing-Singapore. The Summit was organized on zoom an online platform on 16th and 17th February, 2023. The Summit was aimed at creating awareness about the needs of students with high ability and to equip educators with the best practices and tools for nurturing them. This consisted of 72 participants, all highly qualified educators, teachers, professors as well as researchers from more than 6 Asian countries. This was the first time ever an Summit was organised to initiate the Asian Academicians, Researchers and Practitioners to be in the same platform and share exchange and note the current practices being done in each of the countries. They shared their knowledge and experiences during this 2 day virtual summit. A variety of topics like supporting the unique intellectual and emotional needs of high ability students, creating ecosystems within the regular school system as well as designing advanced curriculum was the highlight. It was an excellent opportunity for delegates to share their first-hand experience with the teachers, educators and create an atmosphere of learning from one another. Due to the overwhelming responses and excitement, the team intends to continue the practice of continuing the Summit each year for gifted educators and parents.

# Impact of nurturing on gifted students.

Gifted nurturing is one of those programmes that doesn't have a set outcome or conclusion that can be presented in a line graph at the end of 3 years. Most learnings that children pick up during the programme aren't realised or utilised until much later in their lives. Because no gifted programme encourages activities that provide a ready conclusion or a fixed set of steps to arrive at an outcome, it might be difficult for students to place exactly what they've learnt. They are able to discuss the new skills that they acquired from an activity, but are rarely sure if a particular learning objective is satisfied through the activity.

However, as they grow up, step into the real world, garner experiences and opportunities, they find specific context in which they can reflect upon their learnings from so many years ago and then develop those further into skills. As a student who finished her nurturing levels 2 years ago, much of what I learnt is starting to make sense today and I suspect it will continue to for at least a few years.

For instance, in the very first workshop of my nurturing journey, the facilitator pointed out a space in which I could improve to be better at a task. At the time, my II year old brain interpreted that as failure. The facilitator picked up on that too, and asked me why I was upset. As a child who had not been criticised much in my academic life, the realisation that I could attempt something and learn what not to do was daunting. That was also a point that I, now, nearly 5 years later, distinguish as the starting point of my journey to acclimate myself with constructive criticism and shelving perfectionist habits while learning.

Another introspection triggering stimulus was the first session of an exercise of mentoring juniors, peer mentoring, which drove home the unpleasant realisation that what is known need not be broadcasted as known all the time.

Nurturing also helps to develop and build potential. This seems like a pretty vague and faraway thought, but an example would be my profile in level 2, which said that I had the potential to become a leader if nurtured. At that age, this seemed improbable and did not make a lot of sense. In a discussion with a facilitator nearly 4 years after that profile, and a month after I was elected as head girl, did that profile make sense.

The effect of nurturing on gifted kids is best analysed a few years after their active nurturing is complete, and the question comes up "What would've happened if i didn't have those experiences to teach me all that I practice today?". Nurturing equips children to explore a little bit further than their comfort zones and generate the lifelong possibility of always becoming more, by simply doing more.

# A feather in our cap-Nurturing girl child prodigies

Born to shine, a CSR initiative of Zee Entertainment Enterprises Limited, is a nationwide endeavour to help groom 30 girl prodigies in various fields of cultural art forms. This includes providing the prodigies with a scholarship to help them avail the resources they need to pursue their talent and to provide them with mentoring and nurturing. Through 'Give Foundation', a notfor-profit company, Kaveri Gifted Education and Research Center (a 9 year old initiative of Kannada Sangha) has received funding to assess and nurture these prodigies, as well as act as a liaison between the artists based in the fields and the prodigies to provide them with insightful advice and guidance. The nurturing and development of the prodigies have been constructed into a multi-objective programme, which spans between two years. This programme includes profiling the prodigies to understand their needs, working with the parents and the prodigies and conducting annual overnight camps for their holistic development. KGERC will continue to employ the Panchakosh model to serve these talented girls hoping they would become leaders, role models, inspiration to preserve and advance Indian artforms across India.

We have also been consulted for the knowledge Series created as a part of this project to create awareness about talent development.
